County of Daviess

On this twenty second day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty two, personally appeared in open court, before the Honorable the Judges of the Circuit Court of said County of Daviess, now sitting, William Horrell, a resident of the State and County aforesaid, aged seventy five years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832:

That he entered the service of the United States under the following assumed names and served as herein stated:

That about the latter part of August 1776, he volunteered under Captain Higginbottom, at Luckhurst Court-house, in Luckhurst County, Virginia, where he then resided; that at that time two companies were raised by voluntary enrollment, at a general muster of the Militia of Luckhurst County, one commanded by Captain Higginbottom, to which he belongs, and the other commanded by Captain Joseph Cattle; that they were marched by the way of Petersburg to Williamsburg, where the troops were disbanded, and the company to which he belonged was attached to Colonel Mason's regiment, and Major Joseph Cattle's Battalion, (the said Joseph Cattle having been promoted from the rank of Captain to that of Major, and his brother Nicholas Cattle Commandant of company); that he continued to serve in said company, and under the Officers aforesaid, until the expiration of three months, when the time for which he volunteered expired; the troops discharged, and he returned home.

That, in August, or September, 1777, he enlisted, for the term of six months, with one Thomas Morrison, who was called a recruiting Officer, and was marched by said Morrison, to Staunton in Augusta County, where he was placed under Captain Alexander Henderson, Colonels Lichen and Boyer; that the regiment to which he then belonged, formed a part of the Army commanded by General McIntosh, and was marched by Gen. McIntosh, in pursuit of the hostile Indians, to the Ohio river which they crossed about thirty miles below Pittsburg, that they erected Fort McIntosh, and then continued their march into the interior of the Country (Now State of Ohio) until they reached the Piceanawas River, where they built Fort Laurence, where Colonel Hedden was left with a detachment of the Army, Commander of the fort, and Gen. McIntosh with the remaining troops, including Capt Henderson's company, returned to Fort McIntosh where they remained until the term of their enlistment expired; when he too

appears to be a Clergyman, in the year 1809 he resided in
 the County of Surinam, where he had some time resided.
 He has no recollection of his age, but has been informed by his parents, and
 an older brother who has seen the papers, that he was born in the year above
 stated. He never received a written discharge from the service, he has
 stated as nearly as he can recollect, the manner he was called into service,
 that different periods when he was called into service, and the manner
 of his service, and he hereby refers the Court to the Reverend & Wise, the
 Rev. R. Hawley, G. Martin, & Mr. G. Wolf Dogis, and to Judges Murphy and
 Chapman themselves, for testimony as to his character for veracity, and their
 belief of his service as a soldier of the Revolution. ~~He has been~~

 him upwards of twenty years, and understood that he served in the

Personally appeared before me, the undersigned Justice of the Peace, in and for the County and State aforesaid, William Morrall, the within named declarant, who, being duly sworn, deposes and saith, that, by reason of old age, and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his services, but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the period below, and in the following grades: For three months, I served as a private volunteer under Capt Higginbottom. For six months, I served as a private (regular soldier) under Thomas Morrison and Capt Alexander Henderson. For three months I served as a private volunteer under Capt John Morrison. For three months and eight or ten days, I served as a private volunteer (part of said last term under Lieutenant James Montgomery, and the remainder under Capt David Shetton). For two months and upwards of twenty days, I served as a private volunteer under Capt John Brown, which services are more fully expressed in the foregoing Declaration; and I am confident, that, during the whole periods above, I served not less than one year and six months as a soldier of the American Revolution; and for such services I claim a pension.

From August 1776 for 3 months in Captain Higginbottom's Company, Colonel Mason's Regiment.

From August or September 1777 for 6 months in Captains Thomas Morrison and Alexander Henderson's Company, Colonels Gibson and Beyer's Regiment.

From August 1780 for 3 months in Captain John Morrison's Company, Colonels Meigs and Randal's Regiment.

Reference is made to your request for information relative to Revolutionary soldiers, William Horrell, James I. Lett and Randall Lett.

The Revolutionary War records of this office fail to afford any information in regard to Randall Lett.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S. 17472, based upon the Revolutionary War service of William Horrell or Horwall.

He was born in 1757 in Albemarle County, Virginia.

When twelve or thirteen years of age he moved with his parents, their names not given, to Amherst County, Virginia.

He enlisted at Amherst Court House, Amherst County, Virginia, in August, 1776, and served three months as private in Captain Higgenbottom's company in Colonel Mason's Virginia regiment. He enlisted in August or September, 1777, and served six months in Captains Thomas Morrison's and Alexander Henderson's companies in Colonel Gibson and Hoyer's Virginia regiment. He enlisted in August, 1780, and served three months as private in Captain John Morrison's company in Colonel Meigs' and Randal's Virginia regiment. He enlisted in January, 1781, and served three months as private in Captain David Shelton's Virginia company. He enlisted in September, 1781, served as private in Captain John Lovin's company in Colonel Richardson and Randal's Virginia regiment, was in the siege of Yorktown and was discharged in December, 1781.

In 1784 he moved to Union County, South Carolina, and in 1809 he moved to Daviess County, Indiana.

William Herrall or Herral was allowed pension on his application executed September 28, 1832, and was then living in Daviess County, Indiana.

In 1839 the soldier referred to an older brother but did not give his name. The papers in this claim contain no further data relative to family.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S. 38912, based upon the military service of James Lett. The name does not appear as James I. Lett.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of James Lett were not given.

He enlisted, date not given, at Fayetteville, North Carolina, in Captain Clement Hall's company in Colonel Archibald Lytle's North Carolina regiment. He served seven years as private and was wounded in the head and left foot in the battle of Sulaw Springs. He was in several other battles which were not designated.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 8, 1832, at which time he was living in Spartanburgh District, South Carolina, and stated that he was seventy-three years of age. The exact date of his birth was not given.

In 1822 he stated that he had no family to support him. This was the only reference made to family.

He died November 30, 1838.

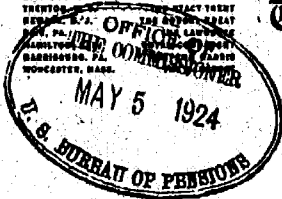

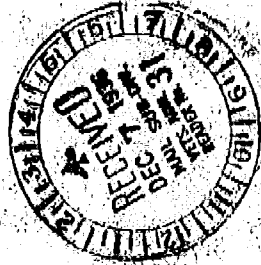
